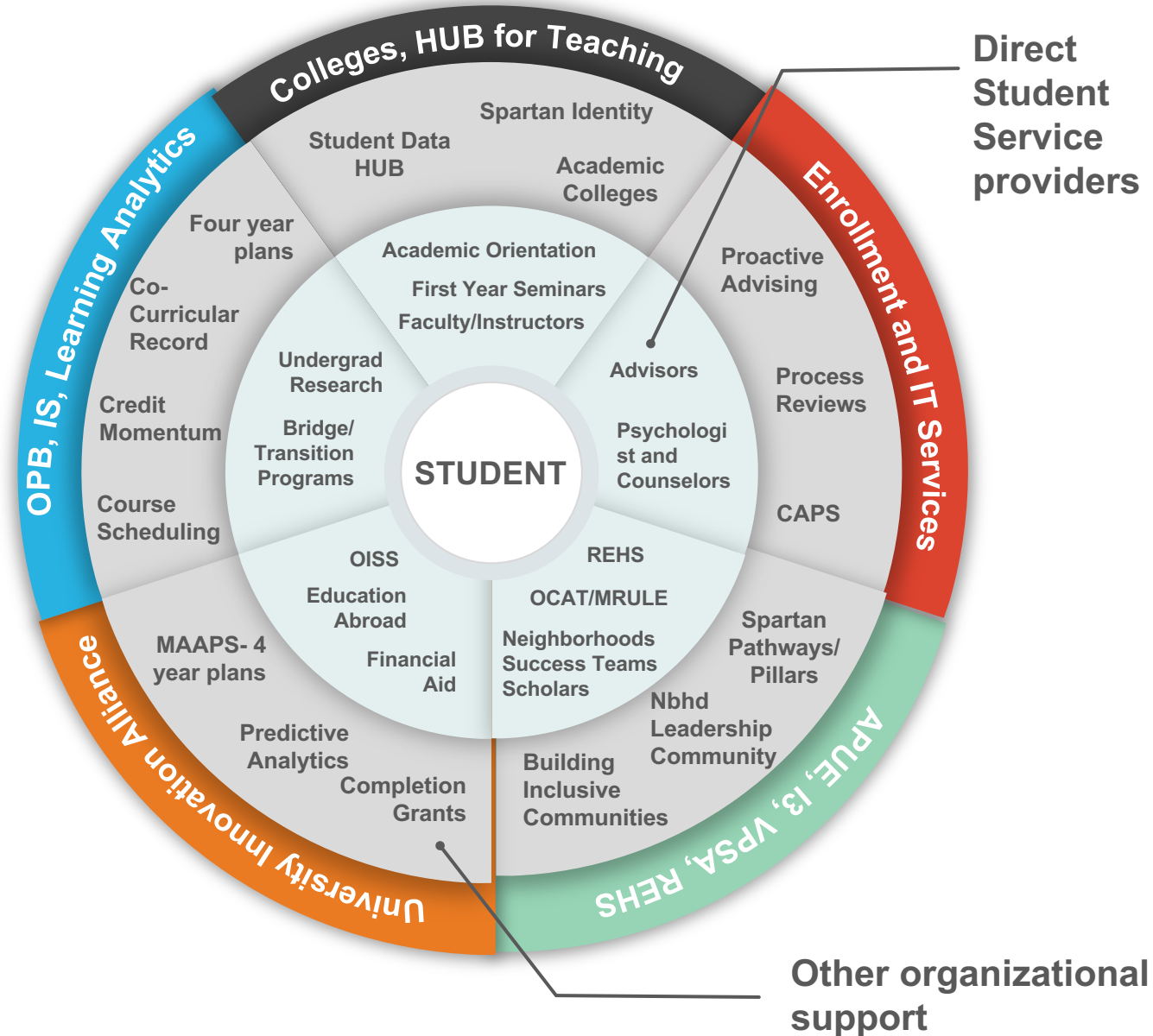

Teach for success by fostering belonging through inclusive curriculum, raising student voices in a safe environment, and emphasizing the ceaselessness of learning

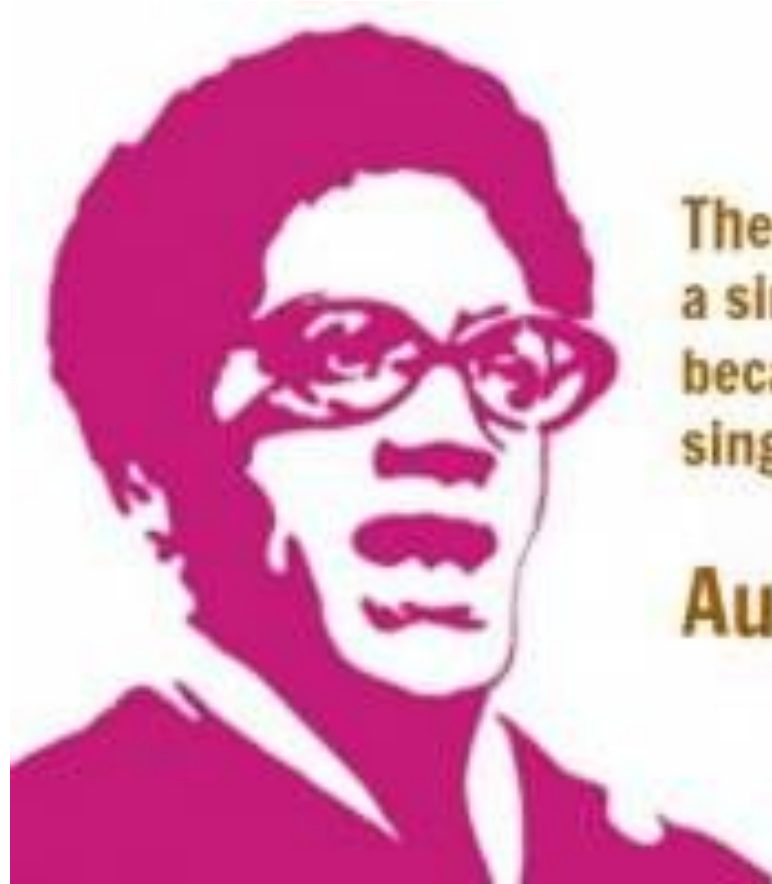
Educate for success by calling attention to the Eurocentric foundation of higher-education spaces and centering the stories of “otherized” groups

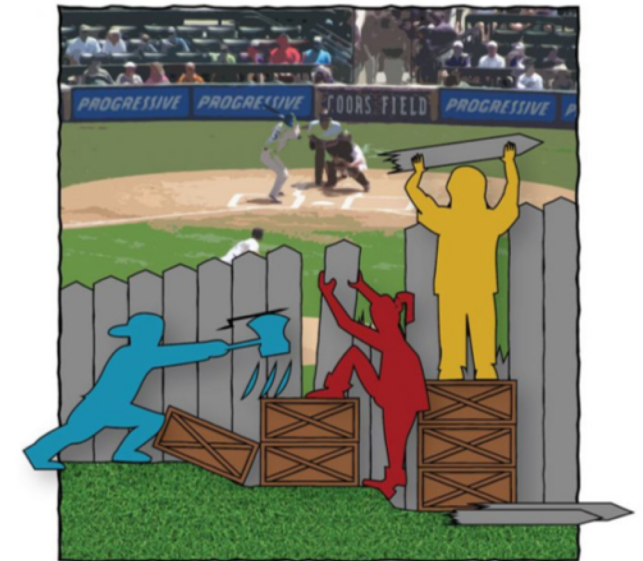
